dying destroyed our death, and by rising again hath restored us to life. And therefore with Angels and Archangels, with Thrones and Dominations, and with all the hosts of the heavenly army, we sing a hymn to Thy glory, evermore saying: — *Sanctus*.

A POPE AND MARTYR of the second century appears in the Calendar today. The martyrs stand in clusters near our Risen Lord; they are the Eagles of which Jesus speaks in the Gospel as gathering together around their longed-for object (Mt. 24:28). Anicetus is not the only Pope whose martyrdom has to be celebrated during Paschal Time; others will come, adding to our Easter joy. The Saint who claims our attention today is one of those whose holy actions are shrouded in the venerable gloom of the Church, and yet his memory will

be held in veneration to the end of time, not only as being the eleventh successor of St. Peter in the See of Rome, but as having imitated him also in holiness of life. St. Polycarp came from Smyrna to Rome, in order to visit Anicetus and receive his advice. There have also been transmitted to us one or two instances of the zeal wherewith Anicetus defended the Church against the arch-heretics Valerian and Marcion. In a word, we know that Anicetus was a martyr, and that is enough to immortalize his name.
