There is not even a tradition concerning Joseph's burial place, nor is there any spot where his relics are venerated. Silent in life, silent in death, he was stripped of all things not essential to true glory.

He, above all, was that saint who understood, as Bossuet says, "That to be hidden in Christ Iesus is of all glories the greatest." He had sought not what the world admires, but what was pleasing to his Lord. If, in effacing himself before the Divine will, he had already procured for himself the greatest of joys, these were only a prelude to the marvelous rewards with which God would crown him. According to his self-abasement, so would his exaltation be. Because he did not try to appear before men, he would be glorified in their sight. Because he loved to be hidden and unknown, God would make his light shine for all the world to see. But God wished to leave to men to discover his greatness, to become ever more aware of his radiance as if to prove in his case the truth of Jacob's prophecy concerning that other Joseph of the Old Testament: Joseph accrescens -Joseph destined to be raised on high.

After his death Mary surely spoke to St. John and the other Apostles of him who had surrounded her with such devoted care, whom she had loved with such virginal tenderness. It might be said that the first panegyrics to St. Joseph were preached by Mary.

Yet devotion to him in the early Christian Church was non-existent, or at least no trace of it can be found. His name and memory were wrapped in obscurity. That silence so complete in his earthly life seemed to be continued in his heavenly life, as if nothing concerning him was ever to be known.

This apparent obloquy is easily explained. As the Church was then still in a state of struggle and formation, it was essential that before devotion to the spouse of Mary could be promulgated, it was necessary that her virginity be recognized and revered, and at the same time the divinity of her Son be well established. In favoring devotion to St. Joseph, the Church feared there might arise misunderstandings, that the honor paid to him might be taken as honor paid to the father of Jesus according to the flesh.... The long delay, however, served but to enhance with greater splendor the field of glory on which one day he was to be crowned. The time came when God could no longer allow one to whom he had shown such deference while on earth to remain longer in ob-
